The Singapore Cooperation Programme (SCP)

- Young nation with no resources but had friends like Japan, Germany and countries in the British Commonwealth
- Singapore has been providing technical assistance since the 1960s
- The Singapore Cooperation Programme was established in 1992

The Singapore Cooperation Programme (SCP)

SCP Philosophy:

"Give a man a fish and you will feed him for a day Teach a man to fish and you will feed him for life"

Focus on human resource capacity building

- Bilateral Programmes
 - Annual Training Calendar
 - Focus on human capacity building and core areas where Singapore has expertise
- Third Country Training Programmes (TCTP)
 - Pool resources and expertise from both sides








The Singapore Cooperation Programme (SCP)

- 8. Public Administration, Governance and Law
















SCP's Key Best Practices

Introduction to the Initiative for ASEAN Integration (IAI)


- Launched in 2000 at the 4th ASEAN Informal Summit in Singapore
- Aims to help new and less developed members achieve the goal of an integrated ASEAN community by 2015
- Singapore has pledged close to S\$119 million to the IAI since 2002
- Countries of focus: Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar and Vietnam (CLMV)

- Accelerate the integration of CLMV countries through human capacity building programmes
- Established a training centre in each of the CLMV capital
- Over last 8 years, 16,052 out of 27,447 officials who participated in SCP were trained at the IAI training centres in CLMV (58.5%)
- Work closely with CLMV countries to identify and assess their development needs in offering technical assistance
- Applied SCP's key best practices (3Cs)



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Initiative for ASEAN Integration (IAI)

- Tangible Outcomes
 - Accelerated integration of newer ASEAN countries into ASEAN
 - Shortened learning curve and enhanced competitiveness
 - 3. CLMV participants acquired relevant skills and knowledge aligned to their priority development needs
 - 4. Recipient countries had a direct, proactive role in determining their development and learning journey

Challenges for Technical Cooperation

- Responding to changing regional and global landscape
 - i.e. environmental sustainability, emerging diseases and pandemics, trade and economics, disaster response and management
- Doing more with same or less
- Achieving win-win outcomes
- Creating synergistic partnerships
