

About the workshop

The COVID-19 pandemic has disrupted education systems and exacerbated pre-existing inequalities. Many factors, including limited access to remote learning and increased financial pressure on poor households, are likely to amplify the learning crisis and adversely affect students who were already lagging behind prior to the pandemic.

Foundations have a growing appetite for rigorous evidence to inform their funding and programmatic work. This seminar, organised by the OECD Network of Foundations Working for Development (netFWD), in partnership with the Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab (J-PAL), will shed light on existing access, quality and equity challenges in education and provide an up-to-date summary of evidence-based approaches to educational outcomes.

Key questions include:

- What are the main (and new) equity challenges in access to education and learning in developing countries?
- What is the evidence on how to help all children learn during —and after— the COVID-19 pandemic?
 - o How can parents best support students' learning and wellbeing?
 - O What role can technology play in reducing learning gaps?
 - What are remaining open questions where more evidence is needed?
