

About the meeting

In recent years, foundations have broadened their ambitions, moving from narrowly-defined interventions to bolder objectives aimed at dismantling the discriminatory social systems, norms and practices that perpetuate gender inequalities. Foundations increasingly collaborate to shape the informal rules, norms, and dynamics that hold a system in place. They also strive to inform the public policy agenda and promote policy alternatives.

Gender equality is a core development objective that requires bold efforts from different perspectives. While some foundations primarily focus on the provision of data and research to inform social change, others predominantly support grassroots organisations and rely on local movements.¹

The OECD netFWD Gender Working Group meeting will bring together global leaders in philanthropy and advocacy experts to explore how can philanthropy pioneer new ways to advocate for gender equality. The meeting will draw on the latest data and report on Private Philanthropy for Development and foundations' experience.

The discussion will explore:

- 1. Evidence: What is the role of evidence and data in advocating for policies that support gender equality? What role do foundations play in tailoring evidence to policy makers' needs?
- 2. Movement-building: Why is it important for foundations step up support to grassroots organisations and help strengthen their capacity? What are the main obstacles and possible solutions for philanthropy to engage with actors at the frontline?
- 3. Obstacles to advocacy: What are the main barriers for foundations to be openly involved in advocacy for gender equality? How can foundations not directly working on gender equality be included in these efforts?

¹ The OECD flagship report Private Philanthropy for Development Volume 2 analysed foundations' engagement in advocacy. Out of 103 foundations surveyed, 84 engage in advocacy. While 73 of them always, often, or occasionally engage in advocacy through research and dissemination, 57 support grassroots movements (OECD, 2021_[2]).
