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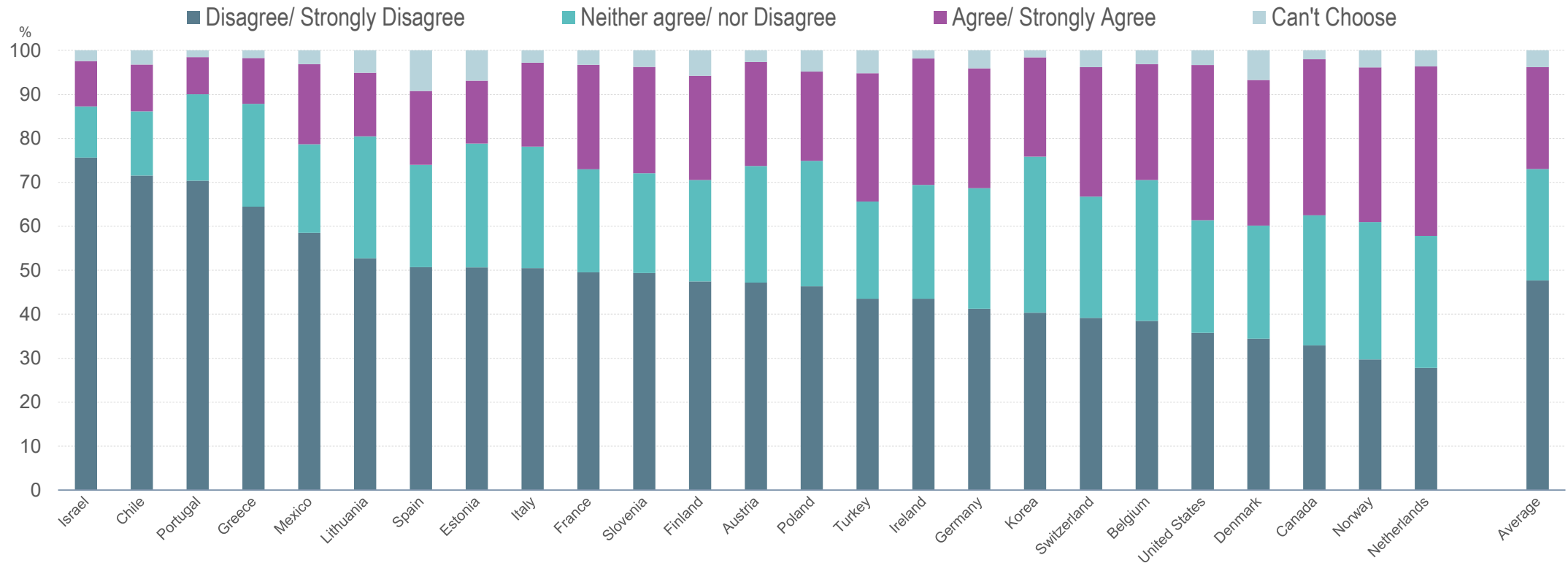


What did we learn from the 2020 Risks that Matter data?

Report Figure 2.7. Many respondents feel they would not be able to receive benefits if they needed them

Share of respondents indicating their level of agreement with the statement
“I think I could easily receive public benefits if I needed them,” 2020.

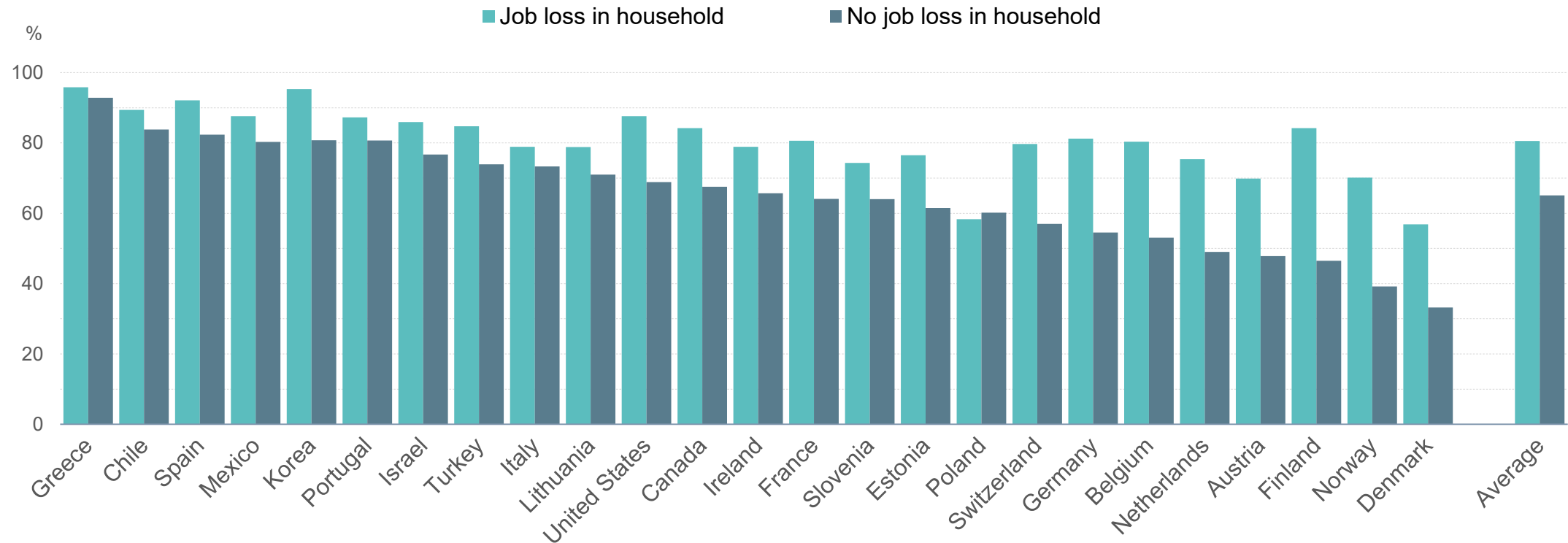

Report Figure 7. Eight out of ten are concerned about their finances and social and economic well-being

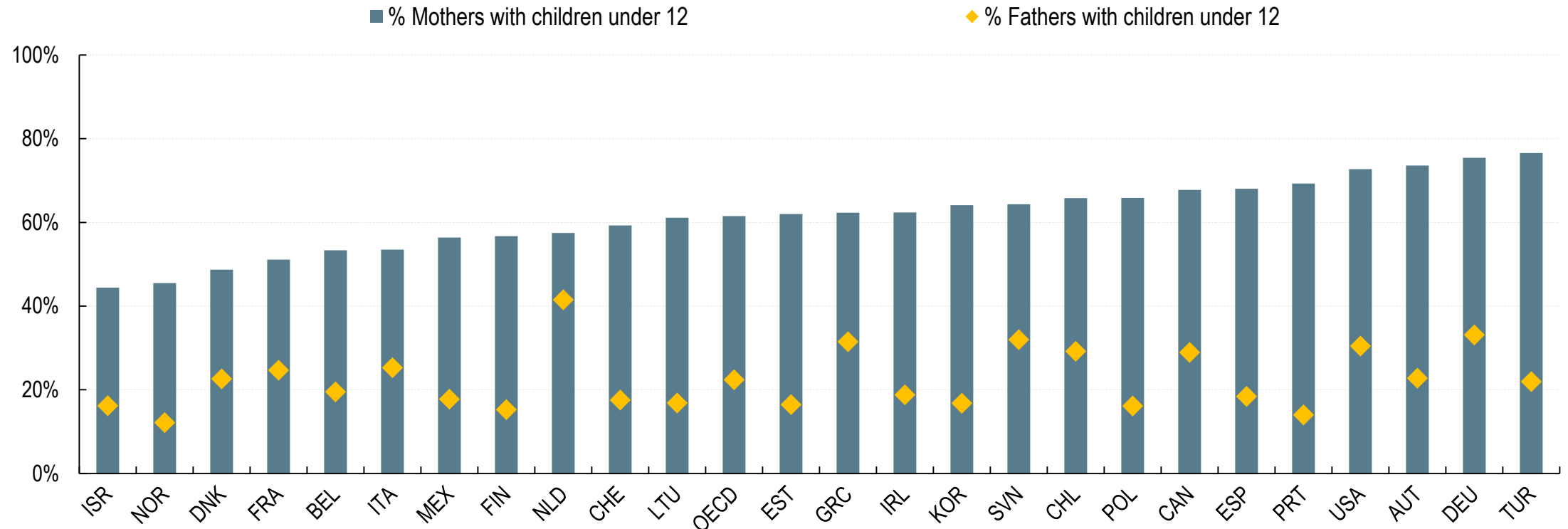

Caregiving in crisis: Gender inequality in paid and unpaid work during COVID-19

Report Figure 3. Mothers were nearly three times as likely as fathers to say they took on most or all of the additional unpaid care work following school and childcare closures

Share of parents with at least one child under 12 who report they took on all/the majority of the added care work, by gender, 2020.

Structure of the survey

Most core questionnaire will remain the same to enable over-time comparisons.

- Risk perceptions
- Perceptions of social protection systems
- Preferences for social protection systems

What are the most pressing challenges for social protection in 2022-2023?

- Ongoing income insecurity?
- Inflation and rising costs of living?
- Economic and social effects of climate change mitigation policies?
