Gabriela Ramos is the OECD Chief of Staff and Sherpa to the G20. Besides supporting the Strategic Agenda of the Secretary General, she is responsible for the contributions of the Organisation to the global agenda, including the G20 (including the OECD's work on anti-corruption) and the G7. Richard V. Reeves

Senior Fellow - Economic Studies, Co-Director - Center on Children and Families, Brookings Foundation

Richard V. Reeves is a senior fellow in Economic Studies, policy director of the Center on Children and Families, and editor-in-chief of the Social Mobility Memos blog. His research focuses on social mobility, inequality, and family change. Prior to joining Brookings, he was director of strategy to the UK's Deputy Prime Minister. Richard's publications for Brookings include Saving Horatio Alger: Equality, Opportunity, and the American Dream (2014), Character and Opportunity (2014), The Glass Floor (2013), and The Parenting Gap (2014). He is also a contributor to The Atlantic, National Affairs, Democracy Journal, the Wall Street Journal and the New York Times. Richard is the author of John Stuart Mill – Victorian Firebrand, an intellectual biography of the British liberal philosopher and politician.

His previous roles include director of Demos, the London-based political think-tank; director of futures at the Work Foundation; principal policy advisor to the Minister for Welfare Reform, research fellow at the Institute for Public Policy Research, and researcher at the Institute of Psychiatry, University of London. He is also a former European Business Speaker of the Year. Richard earned a BA from Oxford University and a PhD from Warwick University. With co-author Isabel V. Sawhill, he was recipient of the "Best Policy Paper" 2014 ranking in the University of Pennsylvania's annual Think Tank Awards.



Maria João Rodrigues

Member of the European Parliament, Vice-President and Parliamentary Secretary of the S&D Group

Maria João Rodrigues, currently Member of the European Parliament, S&D Group Vice President in charge of general coordination and interface with the other EU institutions and member of the Committees of Economic, Employment and Social Affairs, was Minister of Employment in Portugal and has been a policy maker working in several posts in the European Institutions since 2000, notably in the leading teams at EU Presidency. During her work she has helped deliver important outcomes areas such as: the Lisbon Strategy and the EU2020 Strategy; the EU agenda for globalization and the strategic partnerships with the USA, China, Russia, India and Brazil for a new growth model; policy development in key areas; the new Erasmus for mobility, New Skills for New Jobs; responses to the euro-zone crisis; the final negotiation of the Lisbon Treaty and the European Pillar of Social Rights. In academic terms, she was professor of European economic policies in the European Studies Institute - Université Libre de Bruxelles and in the Lisbon University Institute. He was also consultant to the European Commission, International Monetary Fund, the ILO, the World Bank and the Italian Government. He is the founder of the economic policy watchdog website www.lavoce.info, in the editorial board ofwww.voxeu.org, and the Scientific Director of the Festival of Economics in Trento.
