




# 2004/5 Realignment of Territorial Development Policy Objectives

#### "Strengthen our strengths'

- Identify, mobilize and strengthen endogenous growth potential
- Secure employment
- Deploy funding (including ERDF, ESF) more efficiently

#### Two tier approach

- Sectoral fields of excellence → Clusters/innoBB
- Core regional growth areas

Growth locomotives with spillover effects for their regions

Stability anchors in emptying spaces




#### Identification of sectoral fields of excellence

- supraregional / international orientation
- Cooperation with research institutes / universities
- Integration alongside the value creation chain
- Business networks for the development of new products
- Above-average significance for value creation and employment
- Sound chance of growth





# 2011 – From fields of excellence to clusters: Joint Berlin-Brandenburg Innovation Strategy






### Core Regional Growth Areas: Selection criteria

- economic and scientific potential with spill-over capacity
- accumulation of sectoral fields of excellence
- minimum population of 20,000 inhabitants



### "Strengthen our strengths"

- Inter-municipal cooperation
- administration stakeholder cooperation
- Cooperation with business and education
- Cooperation between regional and municipal level



### Core Regional Growth Areas: Implementation

- Support through inter-ministerial working group
- Priority funding
- Integrated development concepts used as basis for the development of specific projects for infrastructure expansion, business park development, supply of skilled labour, technology transfer
- As of 2010: regional budget of €150,000 per year to enable the implementation of projects aimed at strengthening endogenous potential and regional cooperation




#### Core Regional Growth Areas: Evaluation

- 2010 Evaluation by independent consortium, key findings:
- achievement of a good degree of development
- high degree of job centrality indicating high significance for regional and local labor markets
- important paradigm shift from a mentality dominated by subsidies and transfers to one more focused on growth potential, thus creating a new spirit of competitiveness



#### Core Regional Growth Areas – Employment density


(employees per 1,000 inhabitants compared to the year 2000 being set at 100)





#### Core Regional Growth Areas – Commuter flows


(including Berlin)
