Since 2000, the OECD South East Europe Regional Programme has been closely collaborating with economies of the region to foster growth, investment and employment through reforms that support competitiveness and private sector development. The programme addresses regional and national needs, capacities and reform priorities while translating OECD standards and best practices into actionable advice for South East European (SEE) economies (Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Kosovo*, Montenegro, North Macedonia, Romania and Serbia).

WHAT IS THE COMPETITIVENESS OUTLOOK?

Drawing on key OECD tools and standards, the <u>Competitiveness Outlook</u> publication series is the most comprehensive assessment of economic performance, governance and regulation in the six Western Balkan (WB6) economies. It covers key policy areas that are interrelated and make up a holistic structural reform agenda needed to foster competitiveness and socio-economic development.

The Competitiveness Outlook seeks to provide the region's policy makers with a multidimensional benchmarking tool, enabling them to compare performance against regional peers as well as OECD good practices, and to design future policies based on rich evidence and actionable policy recommendations The last edition was launched at the <u>Leaders Meeting of the Berlin Process Western Balkans Summit</u> in July 2021 where several Heads of State and Government lauded that the OECD Competitiveness Outlook's policy recommendations serve not only "as guidance and inspiration for pursuing an ambitious, inclusive and sustainable reform agenda in the Western Balkans" but also "provide a necessary and useful evidence base for the post-COVID-19 recovery of the region."

THE MEETING

The fact-finding meeting will focus on **key policy areas identified for Montenegro by the OECD** through an initial review of qualitative and quantitative questionnaires. The meeting aims to achieve two main objectives:

- 1) Closing information gaps: The discussions will focus on obtaining any remaining information necessary to enhance the understanding of the chosen key policy areas. This will help fill any information gaps and provide a more comprehensive assessment.
- 2) Identifying achievements, challenges, and policy priorities: The meeting will facilitate discussions among participants to identify and discuss key achievements and challenges within the selected policy areas. Additionally, potential policy options will be explored, allowing for an exchange of ideas and perspectives on how to address the identified challenges and further enhance competitiveness.

WHO WILL BE THERE?

The meeting will be attended by the National Competitiveness Outlook co-ordinator, representatives of the Statistical Office, Dimension contact points for the following dimensions: **trade** policy, **investment** policy and promotion, **access to finance**, **tax** policy and **state-owned enterprises**, as well as relevant government representatives and additional contributors to the questionnaires, European Commission and non-government such as NGOs, private-sector, academia representatives.

10:45-12:15 COMPETITIVENESS OUTLOOK 2024: DATA GAPS – BUSINESS ENVIRONMENT IN MONTENEGRO

Drawing on the preliminary inputs collected in the 2024 Competitiveness Outlook assessment, the OECD will provide an overview of the policy landscape affecting the business environment in Montenegro, by shedding light on the main policy developments that occurred since the last *Competitiveness Outlook* assessment in 2021. The OECD will then highlight the data gaps across the five policy areas, which make up the 2024 *Competitiveness Outlook* Business Environment cluster: (1) Investment policy and promotion; (2) trade policy; (3) access to finance; (4) tax policy; and (5) state-owned enterprises.

The session will aim to collect additional insights from governmental stakeholders on the ongoing and planned policy initiatives with a view to have an accurate understanding of the policies relevant to business environment. The session will contribute to the fact-finding

process by providing a zoom-in on government priorities and recent achievements in the context of improving the business environment in Montenegro.
