■ The Summer Academy

The Summer Academy for Cultural and Creative Industries and Local Development (SACCI) provides capacity building for policy makers and representatives of cultural and creative sectors.

The Summer Academy equips policymakers and practitioners with the tools to design forward-thinking policies that respond to the needs of cultural and creative sectors. Each year, the Summer Academy tackles a different theme, and invites policymakers and practitioners from around the world to share their experiences and learn from international experts in the field. At the end of the course, participants acquire a deeper understanding of the sector's needs and dynamics.

Objectives

The Summer Academy seeks to:

- → Stimulate sharing of knowledge and experience among participants, experts and professionals from several fields related to cultural and creative sectors (CCS).
- → Foster networking and debate around relevant case studies and best practices from the Trentino and Alto Adige Südtirol region (Italy), OECD countries, and beyond.
- → Provide common interpretation tools that will be applied to the analysis of participants' case studies, as well as projects and local practices aimed at promoting CCS and local development.
- → Analyse the process of culture-driven social-economic innovation and the role of CCS in sustainable development.
- → Examine entrepreneurial process in CCS and the importance of creativity and innovation.
- → Promote online and offline social networks among participants in order to exchange knowledge, practical experiences and working methodologies, on CCS and local development.

■ 2024 Focus

Major global trends, such as demographic change, rapid urbanisation, technology, climate change and shifts in global economic power, have the capacity to increase inequalities and disparities and affect the quality of life, outlook, and well-being of communities in both rural and urban areas.

Such megatrends do not exist in a vacuum but, on the contrary, are interlinked. For example, the world's population is projected to reach 9.7 billion by 2050 (UN, World Population Prospects 2022), but these changes look set to be uneven across regions, with rapid population growth (coupled with fast urbanisation) concentrated mainly in Sub-Saharan Africa and other low-income countries, and stagnation or shrinking populations projected for the majority of high-income countries beyond 2030.

For countries with ageing populations, this can mean disruption of, for example, economic growth or the sustainability of public finances and welfare; whilst countries with growing youth populations may face issues such as the lack of revenues to invest in human capital due to high unemployment leading to widespread poverty, political polarisation, individual isolation, and internal and external migration.

The 2024 Summer Academy will explore possible responses to these global trends through debate and showcasing examples of how cultural and creative interventions, can help communities and individuals to bridge divisions and move towards a more equal society based on human potential. Particular attention will also be given to the opportunities offered by digital technologies and other emerging methods to boost and enhance the power of culture as a tool for social cohesion.

As awareness of the role of culture in building, connecting, and sustaining communities' health, well-being, and equitable growth is rapidly spreading, our Summer Academy is, as ever, at the forefront of disseminating the latest research and practices to enable participants to respond more actively and imaginatively to the effects of the megatrends facing us all.

■ 2024 main themes

Reconnecting communities

Over half the global population lives in urban areas, up from around one-third in 1950 and projected to increase to around two-thirds in 2050 (UN, World Urbanisation Prospect 2018). However, in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic, and increasing remote working, there is opportunity for smaller places to attract people seeking a better quality of life. A combination of rapid urbanisation, the depopulation of rural areas, and an ever-faster succession of climate disasters is deepening economic, spatial and health disparities across the globe. Culture can unlock opportunities for local communities to reach across divides, participate in democratic life, learn new skills and regenerate environments. This session will feature examples of art-led holistic regeneration or culture-led readaptation of heritage for improving the health and economic and social well-being of communities.

Crossing cultures

International migration is at an all-time high in many OECD countries, and it is estimated that more than 20 million people a year are already internally displaced by climate-related events (OECD, International Migration 2023). Even without moving countries, people across the world are more exposed than ever before to different cultures through digital technologies. In this globalised world, characterised by vast movements of people, developing a capacity and the skills to listen, learn, and communicate with other cultures is key to the success of a cohesive society. Culture can help to transcend our differences, bring us closer and make us appreciate the contribution outsiders make to places they call home. This session will focus on intercultural dialogue and how cultural and creative activities can bring people together.

Bridging generational divides

Approximately 10% of the global population is aged 65 or over and this proportion is predicted to increase to nearly 12% in 2030 and 16% 2050 (UN, World Population Prospects 2022). At the same time, the 46 least developed countries are among the world's fastest-growing and many are projected to double in population by 2050.

These demographic changes have important implications for who produces and consumes culture, and pose challenges which culture and creative activities can look to address. Sessions during this day will showcase examples of initiatives which demonstrate how culture can help to combat loneliness and isolation, build bridges between generations and tackle some of the challenges associated with growing, declining or aging populations.

■ Methodology

The Summer Academy fosters a hands-on approach, which introduces participants to the overall conceptual and theoretical framework of culture and creativity in local development. It invites them to engage proactively, and in creative ways, with local organisations, institutions and places. Substantial time during each day is reserved for discussions to generate and exchange knowledge.

The Summer Academy allows participants to consider real-life situations and to engage with practical challenges faced by their organisations and institutions.

- Each day, different aspects of the Summer Academy's main themes will be explored through debates, presentations and discussions, featuring speakers, professionals, and practitioners working with these topics locally, nationally or internationally.
- Participants will also have the chance to present and discuss their own case studies.
- Finally, study visits within the host region of Trentino will offer participants hands-on learning around how cultural and creative sectors are working on the ground and are promoted across this province.

- → A case study (project, programme or initiative, which is currently being implemented or has concluded within the last 5 years and is directly related to the candidate's professional experience).

The number of participants for the Summer Academy is limited to 24. The selection process will be finalised by mid-May.

The Summer Academy is held on 1-4 July 2024 at the OECD Trento Centre for Local Development, Italy.
