They are not intended to replace other evaluation outputs you might produce within your own agency (such as briefs or summaries), but can be an additional opportunity to draw attention to major studies or bring together findings from several evaluations.

A few basic guidelines for the series: "Evaluation Insights" notes should

- highlight relevant policy messages from an evaluation or synthesise emerging findings on a
  particular topic, for relevant policy communities <u>or</u>, examine questions of evaluation
  methodology, management and policy, for the evaluation community,
- be written in a readable way, for an educated general audience, avoiding acronyms, jargon and technical terms,
- **be concise** with preferably 2.5 pages or 6.5 pages of text for a total length of 4 or 8 pages, respectively (longer 12, 16 or 20 page briefs also possible, depending on the intended audience)
- use photos or graphics,
- be written in **French or English** (and preferably translated to the other).
- The Insights are published under the authority of the individual author (with a disclaimer) or the commissioning evaluation department, as relevant.
