Citizens of 109 countries who want to visit Korea temporarily, however, may enter without a visa according to visa exemption agreements, or in accordance with principles of reciprocity or national interest.

Currently, citizens of OECD COFI member countries can visit Korea without a visa. However, please do double-check at the time of travelling.

(1) Getting to Busan

Busan has great accessibility by air through **Gimhae International Airport**. The airport, one of South Korea's major hubs, is located only 40 minutes away from the downtown area. It can be reached by local flight from the Incheon and Gimpo International Airport.



- **World ⇔ Busan (Gimhae International Airport)**
 - 9 countries, 20 airlines 24 cities, 424 flights per week
- **World ⇔ Incheon International Airport ⇔ Busan (Gimhae International Airport)**
 - Incheon International Airport: 35 countries, 116 cities, 2,766 flights/week
- **World ⇔ Incheon ⇔ Gimpo International Airport ⇔ Busan(Gimhae International Airport)**
 - **Incheon International Airport ⇔ Gimpo International Airport**
 - As flights from Incheon to Busan are NOT as many as from Gimpo to Busan, Ou may have to take a limousine bus or subway at the Incheon Airport to Gimpo Airport to flik to Busan.
 - By Limousine bus: KRW 5 000-6 500 (about USD 5-6), 30-50 min
 - By Subway: KRW 3 200-8 500 (about USD 3-7), 30 min
 - **Gimpo International Airport ⇔ Busan (Gimhae International Airport):** 60-66 flights per week at 30-40 minute interval

(2) Getting to Hotel from the Gimhae International Airport in Busan

Limousine Bus

An airport limousine bus serves the Hotel-Airport route every 20 minutes. It takes about 40 minute from the Gimhae International Airport to the Hotel. The bus stops at the front of the Paradise Hotel. The bus fare is KRW 6 000 (about USD 5).

Taxi

General taxi (white cap) fare is KRW 15 000 -20 000 (about USD 12-18) while deluxe taxi (yellow cap) is more expensive (USD 25-33).

Level	Basic Fare(KRW)	Additional Charge
General Taxi	1 800	KRW 100 for every 170m while driving, every 40 seconds while stopped
Deluxe Taxi	4 200	KRW 200 for every 199m while driving,

*Additional 20% charge after midnight

(3) Busan City Transportation

KRW	1 000	1 500 (1 700 if going beyond the city boundary), 1 800 (late-night rate)

Subway

Classification	Single Trip
One Section (up to 10km)	KRW 1 100
Two Section (over 10km)	KRW 1 300
