About the project

The objective of this project is to support the development of a child-friendly justice system in Egypt by enhancing the institutional coordination, judicial capacity and effectiveness of the Egyptian Child Justice System to better protect children in contact with the law. Aligned with Egypt's Vision 2030, the National Child Strategy and the UN SDGs, the project is implemented by the OECD with the financial support of the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation.

As part of the MENA-OECD Governance Programme, this project will support the National Council for Childhood and Motherhood (NCCM) as the main national entity in charge of policymaking, planning and implementing programmes for the protection of children in contact with the law.

The project will facilitate high-level engagement in support of effective implementation of the objectives of the Strategic Framework and National Plan for Childhood and Motherhood in Egypt (SF&NPCM) for the years 2018-2030 to contribute to strengthening the Rule of Law and enable a child-friendly justice system in Egypt. The project will also avail experiences from OECD countries particularly through peer-to-peer exchanges and policy dialogue with the Government of Egypt.

Rationale for the project

Children face several difficulties to access justice systems. This is also the case in Egypt where children represent around 40% of the population¹ and challenges persist in enabling a child-friendly pathway. The system requires further measures to ensure that related officials and social workers can safely carry out their tasks in providing more child-friendly environment in line with the Egyptian Child Law of 2008. These challenges are further heightened in the midst of a crisis such as the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic.

Egypt ratified several conventions related to the rights and welfare of children; including the UNCRC and has placed the issue of childhood as top priority of its National Agenda. The Egyptian Constitution of 2014 also stated an integral set of fundamental rights for the Egyptian child, complementing the Child Law. Despite significant work and reforms undertaken by the Egyptian government to better protect children and enable a child-friendly justice pathway, challenges persist to improve children's experiences on a daily basis when they are in contact with the justice system.² There is an essential need to enhance coordination of efforts amongst the key national stakeholders for a more coherent approach and sustainable results of the application of the Child Law.³


Objectives of the project

The overall objective of this action is to enable a child friendly Justice system in Egypt and to ensure its alignment with Egypt's Vision 2030, the UN SDGs and international standards.

The two main outcomes of the project will be as follows:

- Improved capacities of child-justice stakeholders to better protect children in contact with the justice system;
- Improved governance and coordination mechanisms among key child justice stakeholders.

The Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation

The OECD supports countries in moving towards child-friendly justice that puts children at the centre of design and delivery of justice services and ensures their needs are met.
