### Using municipal and regional fiscal data to analyse decentralisation and multilevel governance 13 December 2022

#### What is the issue?

There are still many gaps in local finance data, especially concerning disaggregated data of individual municipalities or regions. While these data exist at the national level in each country, there is currently no platform to compare and analyse municipal and regional finance between countries, and sometimes even between levels of government within the same country. Yet these data are necessary and valuable information for truly assessing the capacities and decision-making power of municipalities and regions, and for evaluating the levels of disparity and distribution of subnational government expenditure and revenue.

To fill-in these gaps, the OECD and EU have begun collaboration on the project, "Strengthening analytical frameworks and data on subnational government finance and public employment". The aim is to create unique databases with aggregated and disaggregated data on public finance, at regional and municipal levels (REGOFI and MUNIFI).

## Towards a Database on Subnational Public Employment

#### **14 December 2022**

#### Background

In 2018-2019, the OECD and the European Commission (EC) initiated a partnership to support data collection and the elaboration of new indicators to better assess decentralisation and subnational public finance in 24 OECD and EU countries. The work resulted in the creation of the Regional Government Finance and Investment Database (REGOFI) and two datasets on municipal fiscal data.

In 2021–2024, the OECD and the EC continue partnering to expand the data collection to the individual regional and local government levels on subnational finance and investment and develop, for the first time, a pilot database on subnational public employment (SNPE) with a gender perspective. This pilot database will serve as a basis to assess the level of human capacity in regions and municipalities across OECD and EU countries. In relation with the databases on regional and municipal fiscal data, the SNPE may also enable to overview the linkages between the share and characteristics of subnational public employment, and the level of fiscal decentralisation of subnational governments in OECD and EU countries. This database may also potentially serve as a tool to support policymaking in EU and OECD countries by allowing a comprehensive picture of the needs and gaps on human capacities of territorial entities.
