### Measuring progress better: Cutting-edge approaches to monitoring and evaluating place-based policies

#### Background

In a constantly shifting global environment, place-based policies need to be regularly, rigorously and rapidly evaluated to assess their impact and cost-effectiveness and enable policymakers to quickly adapt and improve their approaches. Several countries have developed sophisticated approaches, while the European Commission is also assessing the impact of EU cohesion policy on a regular basis. Building on evaluations already conducted, it is possible to advance the debate and find evidence of "what works", and the equally important question of "what works where."

Evaluating place-based policies begins with collecting relevant data at a relevant scale, which can often present challenges when data collection becomes costly and complex, especially when collected in real-time and at granular scales. Proper evaluation also depends on the use of suitable indicators built upon the data that is available. Evaluation also requires defining the correct level of geography to identify both the direct effects (e.g., additional goods or services provided) and indirect effects (e.g., induced wellbeing impacts, changes in productivity, job creation, environmental quality, etc.). Monitoring should ideally be done continuously, starting before a policy intervention, and be sensitive to linkages with national policies, broader macro-economic and regulatory frameworks, as well as other space-blind approaches that inevitably affect the outcomes of interest at the local level. Finally, yet importantly, the very use of place-based policy evaluation to inspire the adoption of good practices is key for effective public action.

To deploy place-based policies more effectively, it is necessary to first take stock of how place-based policies have been monitored and evaluated, with an aim to learn from good practices and previous mistakes. A discussion is needed to share the experiences of countries in devising evaluation mechanisms for place-based policies. A review of cutting-edge methods and new data sources is also needed to develop evaluation and monitoring frameworks for place-based policies into the future.

### Key topics

The fourth seminar of the series will address key framing questions, such as:

- What can we learn from previous approaches aiming to monitor and evaluate place-based policies?
- How can past place-based policies best be evaluated to grasp "what works" under various circumstances and inform future policymaking?
- Which outcomes are particularly relevant for monitoring, given policy contexts and resource limitations? How can we create a framework for developing suitable indicators and otherwise monitoring outcomes that are comparable across regions, given data limitations and the widening scope of place-based policies, today and in the future?
- How can we identify and utilise new data sources and methods to better evaluate and monitor placebased policies? What diffusion of evaluation results and their use for policy making can best lead to the adoption of good practices?
- How can we use experimentation to analyse impacts of place-based policies?
