The subject - and Network on Fiscal Relations

Employment policy as a national or local responsibility?

- Activation and job placement: a service with spillovers/externalities across jurisdictions, dependent on activity levels, closely related to (municipal) social assistance programs
- Income transfers and public welfare: related to activation as well as (national) distribution policy



Different assignment of tasks across levels and jurisdictions, i.e. often asymmetric or 'quasi' - decentralization



Copenhagen workshops

- => From 2005 every 2 nd or 3 rd year with 10 15 participants from OECD countries and OECD org. Collaboration between ministries/research institutions in Korea and Denmark
- => Traditional fiscal federalism issues complementary to NFR's analysis
- ⇒ Six workshops:
- 2007: Measuring local government expenditure needs
- 2009: General grants versus earmarked grants
- 2011: Balance between decentralization and merit
- 2013: Interaction between local expenditure responsibilities and local tax policy
- 2015: Decentralisation of education, health and social protection
- · 2018: Changing labour market and the role of subnational governments

- => Changing labour markets these years

Headlines:

- The content of decentralization meaning in the area of labour market policy

- Financial issues equalization, reimbursements and incentives
- Asymmetric decentralization Pareto improving?



Chapter 1 on productivity, jobs and decentralisation (1): some main findings

Some 'stylized facts' of fiscal decentralisation:

- 1) Decentralisation of spending without revenue: tends to lower employment and growth
- 2) Decentralisation of revenues in isolation: associated with job gains and regional growth



Empirical TL2 - regional studies of globalization and open economies show:


- a) reduce possible negative effects on gowth from isolated spending decentralization
- b) reduce possible positive effects on growth from isolated revenue decentralization



=> Net effects: globalization tends to lower disadvantages of vertical fiscal imbalances (=>figure)
